# Exciting News for March from the Recycling Program!

### Plastic Bag/Film Recycling

In March we are adding plastic film recycling to our services! We have been working on it for a while and are partnering with Trex who uses certain types of plastic bags and film to make composite decking and railing. This means we can keep more plastic out of the trash and landfill. Please note—It is still best to NOT use plastic bags if you can avoid it! But in those cases where you can't avoid plastic bags, like that bag of ice, or loaf of bread in a bag, please recycle them now that we can!

#### **One-Year Anniversary for Lapwai Community Recycling**

March 28<sup>th</sup> marks the one-year anniversary of our Lapwai Community Recycling Program. We are very excited about how this program is working. During the first year, we have collected over two tons of cardboard and more than a ton of plastic bottles, paper, and cans, averaging about 230 pounds per month (not counting the cardboard) with about 30 people showing up at each event!
